1. The 1st and 2nd quizzes are **synchronous** and will be written during regular class scheduled on Jan. 27th, 2:00 - 2:30 pm and Feb 17th, 2:00-2:30 pm. Each quiz is designed to be completed in 25 min but you will have 5 min grace time in case you meet a technical issue. You will have 30-min to complete and submit the quiz. Randomized MCQ and/or short-answer questions will be given to students. The quizzes will be **non-cumulative** but the mid-term will be **cumulative**.

2. If you experience an issue that affects your ability to complete the online assessments, which can include (but is not limited to) issues with technology, time zone issues, caregiving responsibilities, or distractions within your test-taking environment, you will need to contact your instructor as soon as possible.

4. Students are required to read "Sapience: A brief history of humankind". This book includes many insightful information regarding agriculture and plant biology. Book discussion will be held on April 12 in class.

The Department will arrange for a reappraisal of the work within the next ten business days. The reappraisal will only be considered if the student provides a detailed rationale that outlines where and for what reason an error is suspected.
