¹ Class presentations will be scheduled during the second half of the course. Teams of three to four students will give a presentation of approximately 45 minutes based on an assigned paper.

Each piece of work (reports, assignments, quizzes, midterm exam(s) or final examination) submitted by the student will be assigned a grade. The student's grade for each component listed above will be combined with the indicated weights to produce an overall percentage for the course, which will be used to determine the course letter grade.

The reappraisal will only be considered if the student provides a detailed rationale that outlines where and for what reason an error is suspected.
