# **Assignments and Evaluation**

## 1) Participation: (10%)

## 2) Multiple Choice Tests: (20%)

## 3) Blogging Assignment: (15%)

- You will be expected to write a short blog entry based on class discussions
- You will be required to post comments on two separate blog entries written by your classmates
- Further instructions and a schedule of participation will be provided in the first class

#### 4) Paper Proposal: (5%)

- A one page summary of which theory you'd like to study and what you would like to apply that theory to
- Due week 2 via email
- Further instructions will be provided in class

## 5) Theory Paper: (25%)

- For this assignment you will be asked to provide a brief literature review of one of the theories covered in the course
- Due week 4 in class
- 6-8 pages (double spaced)
- You will be required to do research beyond the parameters of the textbook but you will given instruction on how to use the library and write a literature review in class, as well as a detailed grading rubric
- Further Instructions will be provided during the class

#### 6) Final Examination: (25%)

- The exam will consist of a combination of short and long essay questions
- The final will be a take home exam
- It will be handed out in the last class and Due June 29, 2011 11:59 pm
- Questions will cover material from the entire course
- Further instruction will be handed out with the exam

It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment.
