Course Description

Introduces students to the theoretical literature on various aspects of the media, including public policy questions such as the concentration of media ownership, Canadian content requirements, censorship, the role of the media during elections and the problems and opportunities that might be brought by advances in technology.

Objectives of the Course

The course will provide students with a greater understanding of the organisation and economics of the media and cultural industries in Canada. Students will also be asked to consider the role of these industries in the wider social and political context of Canada's national sovereignty and identity.
