Course Description

This course examines the nature, origins and social implications of new media with a focus on the internet. The theme of this course is “societies of control” – the way internet technologies promise new freedoms in exchange for new modes of control. Topics covered include internet infrastructure, the technology industry, surveillance capitalism, algorithms, encryption, and cyberviolence.

Objectives of the Course

By the end of this course, students should be able to

- demonstrate familiarity with critical approaches to the internet.
- explain how key internet-enabled technologies work
- apply critical theories to new media examples
- work effectively and cooperatively in groups, and hand work in on time
- develop presentation style and other research and writing skills

Textbooks and Readings

All readings will be posted to D2L; see reading list below. Students are expected to have all readings completed **prior** to scheduled class times in order to contribute effectively during class discussions and activities.

Assignments and Evaluation

Weight	Course components	Due
20%	Writing prompts These are in-class writing assignments that take place five times throughout the term. They will last from 15 to 30 minutes. Students will be given a notebook to write in, which will be collected at the end of each class. Students can choose their best four out of five entries to count for the 20% (each entry = 5%). 20%	Internet news presentations In groups of 4, students will present for 20 minutes on an internet-related topic in the news, which will be determined by the group in consultation with the instructor. This presentation should be well rehearsed, organized, give a coherent overview of the news story and provide an analysis: critique the story by finding an academic article on the topic and applying it to the news story. At the end of the presentations, groups will run a discussion activity that is creative and involves the whole class.	Throughout the term
15%	Data detox For the week of January 22-29, students will engage in a set of "data detox" activities to be explained in class. On February 5, students will submit a 2-3 page report reflecting on the data detox week, describing what they learned from it, why it was important, and how it will or won't change the way they approach the internet in the future. 15%	Social media profiles In groups of 4, students will set up two new, unique profiles on the same social media site (such as Twitter or Reddit). For one profile, they will create an identity that is clearly female, of a non-white ethnicity, a non-Christian religion and/or non-heteronormative. For the other profile, they will present as a young, heterosexual, white Christian male. Students will spend at least half an hour using each profile to publicly express political opinions, using common hashtags if appropriate: use identical language to express identical opinions for both profiles. These opinions may be at any point on the political spectrum from left to right, but not explicitly abusive or offensive. Students will submit a written report of 3-4 pages (800-1200 words) after this activity that: collects the responses each of the two profiles receives; analyzes their similarities and differences; and discusses how they relate to cyberviolence. 30%	Take-home exam By 4pm on April 9, students will submit an 8-10 page set of responses to a series of exam questions based on course readings that will be given out on April 1. More details and a review for the exam will be provided in class.	April 9

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university. You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
