Course Description

This course seeks to familiarize students with a range of methods and issues entailed in film studies research. It is designed for those with a limited background who wish to augment their understanding of film-based topics and/or to successfully integrate such materials into their own research. Each week we will address one or more approaches deployed within the literature, using these essays as models of film scholarship that can be emulated and adapted to new research agendas. Specifically, the course will focus on developing skills of film analysis and description while investigating key theoretical, historical, and methodological formulations. Areas of focus include issues of medium specificity, decay, and preservation; realism and documentary; the film apparatus, identification, and the gaze; representations of race and gender; cultural analyses via the Frankfurt School; film-philosophy; new technologies and digitality. Filmmakers to be considered include Chantal Akerman, Jean-Luc Godard, Sergei Eisenstein, Werner Herzog, Alfred Hitchcock, Philip Hoffman, Marzieh Makhmalbaf, Chris Marker, Errol Morris, Bill Morrison, Jafar Panahi, Raoul Peck, Agnes Varda, Dziga Vertov, and others.

Additional Information

In addition to the weekly seminar on Fridays, there is a separate screening time every Wednesday, also in SS203. The films are a required element of the course. If you are unable to attend the weekly screening, the films can be viewed online, or at the TFDL the following week. Please be advised that the films are central course texts, not merely supplements: missing a screening, or otherwise failing to view the films every week, will jeopardize your success in the course. Students are strongly encouraged to keep detailed screening notes as ongoing preparation for the course assignments.

Objectives of the Course

As noted in the course description, there are five overlapping objectives:

- To reflect upon the unique qualities of the medium and their conceptual possibilities
- To become familiar with film terminology and analysis, so as to write accurately and fluently on film topics
- To read a range of significant film studies texts, engaging key approaches, issues, and debates in the field

- To become a more skillful film viewer, refining and deepening your assessment of film texts
- To enrich your current and future research activities by the application of new competences in film studies

Textbooks and Readings

There is no single textbook for this course: a diverse selection of texts will be made available via **D2L**. Please note that all readings are **required**, unless otherwise designated, and should be completed every week before class.

Assignments and Evaluation

Participation (weekly)

10%

Regular attendance and informed contributions to seminar discussion are essential course requirements.

In-class Presentation (selected dates)

20%

A 15-minute presentation that relates the assigned reading to the weekly film and initiates a robust discussion. The schedule of presentations will be settled in Week 2 (September 14 $^{\text{th}}$).

Film analysis + short report (due October 12th)

20%

Aesthetic analysis of an excerpt from one of the course screenings, paired with a short report (2 pages) discussing these details. The film excerpt will be assigned in advance, and a discussion prompt will be provided to frame your commentary.

Final Paper (due January 10th 2019)

50%

A paper that demonstrates the competences developed in the course and that benefits the students research interests. The paper may be research-driven, or analytically based: 20 pages, 5000 words (approx.)
