Course Description

An assessment of the various ways in which the history of film production can be approached, including the development of filmmaking technologies, evolutions in cinematic style and narrative traditions, particularly as they relate to popular cinema, and changing industrial practices.

Objectives of the Course

The objective of this course is to provide students with a foundational understanding of the history of film as a technology, commercial medium, and artistic form. Students will also cultivate skills in the stylistic, historical and critical analysis of film.

In order to achieve these objectives, it is imperative that students come to class **prepared**, having completed the assigned readings or other preparatory tasks and willing to discuss pertinent issues with both the instructor and their peers in a thoughtful and respectful manner.

Assignments and Evaluation

- 20% Five pop quizzes, spread randomly over the semester, covering assigned readings for the given week.
- 15% Test, held in class on 2/8. Multiple-choice and short-answer questions covering lectures, readings and screenings from the first four weeks of class.
- 30% 2,500-word research essay, due in class on 3/23. A list of essay topics will be available on Blackboard.
- 35% Final exam, held during the examination period. Multiple-choice, short-answer and essay questions covering lectures, readings and screenings from the entire semester.

Students are responsible for catching up on any material missed due to absence.

In cases of illness or bereavement, late assignments will only be accepted if accompanied by official documentation (e.g. a note from your physician). All other late assignments will be penalized according to the policy detailed below.

It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment.

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. Readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. This includes assignments submitted in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media, and material taken from such sources.
