**Course Description**

An introduction to key historical and theoretical aspects of Canadian film. Topics will include the study of Canadian film auteurs, documentary and social change, feature film genres, and the role of government regulations. Students will explore the central themes and issues facing Canadian filmmakers and audiences.

**Additional Information**

Attendance at both lectures and screenings are essential components of this course. Students must come to class prepared to discuss the films and required reading.

**Objectives of the Course**

The objectives of this course are to provide an overview of Canadian Cinema and to identify and analyze key films, filmmakers, and critical contexts of Canadian Cinema. Students will also develop written skills in the stylistic, cultural, and critical analysis of films.

### **Plagiarism**

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
