# **Course Description**

This course focuses on the films of Alfred Hitchcock, analyzing the director's distinctive style and concerns as these tendencies illuminate wider issues of film aesthetics, history, and interpretation. Surveying Hitchcock's filmmaking practice from the silent era to the 1970s — with special emphasis upon questions related to technology, optics and visual culture; spectatorship and psychoanalysis; and cultural and aesthetic theory—the course offers students the opportunity to view the director's most essential films and to situate these works within a compelling history of international film style. As essential supplements, we will also consider titles by Fritz Lang, Otto Preminger, and more contemporary directors, to contextualize and clarify Hitchcock's contribution to cinema as well as his enduring legacy.

#### Additional Information

This course assumes and requires your familiarity with basic film terms. For your ongoing reference, a 6-page Glossary of Formal Terms will be provided on D2L, under 'Course Documents.' You will be expected to use these terms, and to deploy basic film-analytical skills, in class discussion, online postings, and assignments.

# **Objectives of the Course**

This course has three main objectives:

- 1. Specifically, to examine a range of films by director Alfred Hitchcock so as to discern the stylistic and thematic preoccupations evidenced across his work.
- 2. More generally, to enrich and extend our film-analytical and critical skills, allowing us to approach Hitchcock's films as complex, aesthetic, and historical objects.

3. Finally, to reflect upon the enduring appeal of Hitchcock's work as it frames larger conceptual issues related to seeing, being, and knowing.

# **Viewing Requirements**

The weekly screenings for this course are scheduled on **Mondays 2:00 - 4:45PM**. Please note that attendance at *all* screenings is **required**. For repeat viewings and/or close analysis, the films are held at the TFDL and may be viewed on site; additionally, some course titles may be available online. These resources are not a substitute for the scheduled screenings, but may prove helpful for assignments.

## Participation Requirements

Regular attendance and informed participation are essential components of this course that will help to determine your final grade. You are expected to come to class having completed the assigned readings, and thus prepared to discuss these materials specifically. Please note that a significant percentage of your grade is based on participation. If you do not make an informed contribution to in-class and online discussion on a weekly basis, you can expect to receive **zero** for participation: there is no other basis for this part of your grade. Besides the weekly readings + screenings, there is a simple task to be completed every week, as follows:

Every week, go to the D<sub>2</sub>L site to submit a detailed **screening note** about the weekly film(s). There will be a general question or prompt for you to discuss. Your response should be a paragraph or so in length; it should focus on a detail or raise a specific issue that you plan to talk about in class. These responses are required and must be submitted weekly before the deadline (Wednesday at 10PM, unless specified otherwise). Finally, please be advised that posts that do not respond to the prompt in a specific and thoughtful manner will not accrue marks.

#### **Textbooks and Readings**

There is no single textbook for this course; the required readings comprise a wide selection, and will be available on D<sub>2</sub>L, under Course Documents. Please note that the assigned reading is an essential component of the course: failure to complete the readings consistently every week will substantially impact your grade.

#### Internet and electronic communication device information

Laptops are for note-taking only. Using a laptop for email or unauthorized browsing during class time will jeopardize your grade. Likewise, texting and cell phone use is not permitted during screenings or lectures: turn off these devices when you arrive at the classroom to avoid embarrassment, annoyance, and irreversible participation grade penalties.

\* The **Reading Quizzes**, listed above, are designed to confirm your familiarity with the weekly readings. As such, they will **not** be scheduled in advance but rather will happen on 5 separate occasions throughout the semester, usually during the lecture period. **Reading Quizzes cannot be rescheduled or 'made-up'**; **if you miss a quiz, the marks are forfeited.** Only 4 out of 5 quizzes will count for marks, however: so, you can miss one, or discount one. Please come to class prepared.

#### **Plagiarism**

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university. You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in nontraditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
