2. Prerequisites:

Chemistry 201 or 211, and 203 or 213 or 209. Credit for both Chemistry 357 and any of 351, 353 or 355 will not be allowed.

3. Grading:

The University policy on grading and related matters is described in $\underline{F.1}$ and $\underline{F.2}$ of the online University Calendar. In determining the overall grade in the course the following weights will be used:

Component(s)	Weighting %
Coursework (Including tutorial activities)	25
Midterm exam (during class time Friday March 2, 2018 , room TBA)	25
Final Exam (scheduled by the Registrar)	50

Each piece of work (reports, assignments, quizzes, midterm exam(s) or final examination) submitted by the student will be assigned a grade. The student's grade for each component listed above will be combined with the indicated weights to produce an overall percentage for the course, which will be used to determine the course letter grade.

The conversion between a percentage grade and letter grade is as follows;

Students will be expected to understand at every stage the material covered in all components of the course. In order to satisfy the prerequisite requirements (i.e., C-) for further Chemistry courses, a student must achieve *either* a minimum 50% on the Final examination, *or* a minimum 50% weighted average on the examinations (Midterm and Final).

The coursework mark is based five equally weighted quizzes (written under exam conditions during tutorial time). A classroom participation score based on participation during in-class Top Hat questions may be used to replace the lowest non-zero tutorial quiz score at the end of term.

Bear in mind that a grade of D+ or below will result if a student scores below 50% on the final examinationand scores below 50% on the weighted average of the midterm and final examinations.

4. Missed Components of Term Work:

The regulations of the Faculty of Science pertaining to this matter are found in the Faculty of Science area of the Calendar in <u>Section 3.6</u>. It is the student's responsibility to familiarize himself/herself with these regulations. See also <u>Section E.3</u> of the University Calendar

There are no deferred Midterm/ term test examinations.

In the event that a student misses the midterm or any course work due to illness then an official medical note will be required. Absences must be reported **within 48 hrs**. If a student misses the midterm or a quiz for other reasons (e.g. varsity sports or academic conferences), then analogous documentation will be required. The course coordinator will need to see the original documentation (not an electronic copy) for review / decision and keep it (or a copy) for their records. The documentation must be provided to the course coordinator **within 15 days** of the date of the midterm or quiz in order for an excused absence to be considered. If an excused absence is approved, then the percentage weight of a legitimately missed midterm examination or quiz will be pro-rated among the remaining components of the course. (see Section E.3 of the University Calendar)

If a student missed the midterm or tutorial quiz for non-legitimate reasons (e.g. vacation), and did not perform the activity, the score of that course work in the final course grade will be zero.

Model kits (disassembled and without any markings or writing on them or their container) are allowed in examinations. **No other aids are allowed**, including data sheets, notes, or electronic devices(e.g. calculators).

11. Reappraisal of Grades:

A student wishing a reappraisal, should first attempt to review the graded work with the Course coordinator/instructor or department offering the course. Students with sufficient academic grounds may request a reappraisal. <u>Non-academic grounds are not relevant for grade reappraisals</u>. Students should be aware that the grade being reappraised may be raised, lowered or remain the same. See <u>Section I.3</u> of the University Calendar.

- 1. **Term Work:** The student should present their rationale as effectively and as fully as possible to the Course coordinator/instructor within **15 days** of either being notified about the mark, or of the item's return to the class. If the student is not satisfied with the outcome, the student shall immediately submit the Reappraisal of Graded Term work form to the department in which the course is offered. The department will arrange for a re-assessment of the work if, and only if, the student has sufficient academic grounds. See sections <u>I.1</u> and <u>I.2</u> of the University Calendar
