NOTES

This course is a self-directed online course offered on Desire2Learn (<http://d2l.ucalgary.ca>), with regularly scheduled quizzes and a final exam, all of which will be conducted entirely online. The primary goal of this course is to equip students with the skills necessary to comprehend, acquire, and retain medical and scientific vocabulary derived from Greek and Latin. The course will be particularly useful to students in medicine and the sciences, where a large percentage of the terminology and jargon has a Classical origin. In this course, students will learn the definitions of Greek and Latin words and word elements such as prefixes, bases, and suffixes, as well as English words and definitions derived from these Greek and Latin words. Students should develop a thorough understanding of word formation rules using the Greek and Latin prefixes, bases, and suffixes in order to construct and deconstruct new medical and scientific words.

This course lasts fourteen (14) weeks and is entirely self-directed, covering the entirety of Turley's *Medical Language*. There are no in-class lectures and students are entirely responsible for mastering the material themselves. There is a suggested reading schedule included in this outline which keeps pace with the quizzes.

You may notice that the number of chapters covered by each quiz increases as the semester progresses. However, the number of new terms to master does not change, as the first chapters contain more material than the later chapters by necessity.
