COURSE CALENDAR STATEMENT:

Exploring sexuality and gender in pre-modern Mediterranean societies such as ancient Greece, ancient Rome, Spain, and Byzantium. Course Hours: 3 units; (3-0)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course takes on a thematic approach to the study of gender and sexuality in the ancient Mediterranean. Using ancient art and literary sources we explore topics pertaining to space, relationships, the body, occupation and religion.

As well as listening to traditional lectures, students will engage in group work and online discussions. Assigned readings prepare students for in-class discussions and course assessment.

Please note that that select readings, visual representations and lecture will cover potentially sensitive topics including contemporary political ideologies, race and ethnicity, sex, gender, violence, and religion. We need to acknowledge that viewpoints exist that may be different from our own and that they must be treated in a respectful manner.

*COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Create a learning framework that caters to personal learning goals;
- 2. Demonstrate their knowledge of topics related to gender and sexuality in the ancient Mediterranean;
- 3. Evaluate scholarly works related to gender and sexuality;
- 4. Apply and synthesize scholarly approaches in student's own written work and discussion;

5. Further develop research skills and expressions of written communication.

*LEARNING RESOURCES

There is no textbook to purchase. Readings will be provided in the course D2L site.

CLASS SCHEDULE

A detailed syllabus (readings, assignment dates, holidays) appears in D2L course modules and will be made available the first day of class.

*EXAMINATIONS

No final exam is scheduled for this course. The midterm reflection will be open book (lecture, assigned readings). No other external sources allowed.

*ASSESSMENT COMPONENTS

Clearly outline how learning will be assessed in the course including assessment methods/description, due date and grade weighting. It is recommended that you also include the aligned course learning outcomes and details related to the criteria for assessment.

Expression and Assessment of Personal goals (Total 10%). Students will fill out questionnaires that will help them to evaluate their progress and goals for the semester.

Midterm Self Reflection (30%). Students will offer a self-declaration that they have completed assigned readings, understand lecture materials and weekly course objectives. Citing evidence from course materials (lecture and assigned readings) students will synthesize elements of their own personal learning.

Group workshop sessions in class (30%). On group workshop days (see table below) students will have access to a series of questions that they are required to answer. Responses will appear on the D2L Discussion. Students are expected to create their own responses based on personal knowledge, required readings and lecture materials. External searches on the internet are not permitted. Student will document their roles (time keeper/moderator of discussion; scribe/editor; individual student responses.

Final Research paper (30%) 2500 words, Times New Roman, double spaced. Students will formulate a research question, contextualize the question within a broader scholarly understanding, provide an analysis that draws on ancient literary, ancient visual representation, and secondary scholarship and drawn conclusions. This is a scaffolded assignment with individual requirements and deadlines. Please see D2L for detailed instructions and rubric. All components will be submitted via Dropbox on D2L.
