COURSE CALENDAR STATEMENT:

A survey of ancient science and medicine, with special emphasis on early conceptions of the human mind, thought and knowledge.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will survey the main features of ancient medical thought and practice in the western world (roughly 500 BCE-500 CE), and introduce its most important authors and texts. It will pay special attention to the writings of Hippocrates, Soranus and Galen. The course will also consider some aspects of the social history of medicine, particularly ideas about women and sexuality, and race and ethnicity. Though the majority of the material examined will be textual, there will also be some exploration of archaeological (architectural and artistic) evidence.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand the broad development of rational ancient medicine from its earliest beginnings to the end of the Roman Empire
- Identify and analyze key medical texts and practices from the Classical Greek Age to the end of the Roman Empire
- Interpret primary sources (archaeological and artistic, and textual in translation) to recreate ancient medical thought and practice
- Think critically about the practice of medicine in the past, and reflect on it in relation to the modern world
