COURSE CALENDAR STATEMENT:

A survey of Greek art and architecture from the Bronze Age to the Hellenistic period.

Course Hours:3 units; (3-0)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course provides you with a comprehensive survey of the art and archaeology of Greece from c. 2500 BCE to c. 150 BCE. We will begin with an introduction to the prehistoric civilizations of the Minoans and Mycenaeans as seen through the lenses of their artistic achievements and the archaeological record. The course will then proceed chronologically to examine the various contexts (e.g., mythological, political, social, and economical) in which artisans produced their works (e.g., architecture, sculpture, vase painting) within the "Greek" world. In addition to providing a survey of the major art forms, you will also be asked to think critically about how ancient writers and modern, alike, have responded to these works.

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*COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Analyse and develop a visual vocabulary for key works of Greek material culture
- 2. Think about how scholars have traditionally approached Greek material culture and whether this is the way to continue
- 3. Develop persuasive communication skills through written work and discussion about Greek material culture

If the need should arise where we need to pivot, Zoom will be used during course activities and these sessions will be recorded.
