**Grading**

Essays are assessed in terms of the quality indicated in the first column, then assigned a letter grade on that basis. The numerical value is the same for all examples of a particular letter grade (column 3), except very occasionally for some specific purpose. Because calculations will not always fall exactly on those numerical values, column 4 denotes the range of calculated values that will result in the grade specified in column 2. In principle, grades near the upper end of a range are not rounded up, since the bottom of the next range delineates the minimum value; in reality, however, grades may be rounded up if a good reason for doing so presents itself.
