Topics will reflect developments in current research.

Course Hours: 3 units; (3-0)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The site of Pompeii located in Italy's in the Bay of Naples region reached its fame because of the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 CE. We will explore the city's archaeological remains through the lens of Roman social history to think critically about our perceptions of life in the ancient city. We trace the scholarly interest in the site during the 18th and 19th centuries and analyse its reception into the modern period (e.g. music, literature, and film).

Students will engage in interactive class discussions, critical reading, and writing.

For online courses:

This course will take place online via Desire2Learn (D2L) and Zoom. To best succeed in the course, you are encouraged to participate in the asynchronous learning tasks using the D2L learning environment and synchronous Zoom sessions. You will still have accesses to the materials if you unable to participate live due to the time difference or unforeseen circumstances.

Live Thursday Zoom sessions that you are expected to participate in take place on Thursdays 9:30-10:45 a.m. during the regular academic schedule and each will be recorded.
