Course Description and Goals:

This course surveys the historical origins of religious traditions rooted in Asia—specifically Hinduism, Buddhism, and the Chinese traditions of Confucianism and Taoism. By emphasizing the reading of primary texts in translation, we will explore the major ideas and practices of these traditions, making special note of the cultural, historical, political and material contexts in which they were conceived and expressed. Upon completion of this course, students should possess an historical understanding of these specific traditions and a general working knowledge of how to approach religious literature critically.

Course Requirements:

Participation: Regular class attendance and thorough, thoughtful reading of assigned texts are mandatory. While class will consist primarily of lectures on Mondays and Wednesdays, Friday sessions will be devoted to discussion of course material. These discussions will take place in small groups facilitated by the teaching assistants. Small group tutorials will begin in the third week of class, on Friday, September 26. Group assignments and meeting locations will be announced on Wednesday, September 24.

In preparation for tutorial sessions, students must complete a critical reading of assigned primary texts. A critical reading entails asking exploratory questions of the text. A reading guide students should apply to all assigned texts is included at the end of the course syllabus. In addition, topic-specific reading questions will be posted each week on D2L.

Students' participation will be evaluated based on preparedness for Friday tutorials and productive contribution to tutorial discussions. Productive contribution to discussion is based on proper preparation for class (i.e., completion of assigned readings), is relevant to the week's topic, and is expressed in a respectful manner. Students should note that all discourse in this class—whether on-line or in class—is to be expressed in a manner that is respectful of the professor, teaching assistants, and other students. Students will receive feedback and guidance on their participation grades throughout the semester.

Students should note that credit for participation is contingent upon attendance at, and participation in, Friday tutorials. Excessive absence will result in failing marks for participation.

Exams: Students will write three in-class exams during the term. Exams will test students' understanding of assigned primary-text readings, mastery of key concepts and vocabulary, and ability to analyze these texts and concepts with respect to their historical and cultural contexts. Details on the format of exams will be provided in class.

Exam 1 (Hinduism): Monday, October 6

Exam 2 (Buddhism): Monday, November 3

Exam 3 (Confucianism & Taoism): Friday, December 5

Only in cases of genuine emergency will arrangements for make-up exams be made. In cases of genuine emergency, students **must** notify the instructor and their teaching assistant no later than 24 hours after the missed exam. Failure to do so may result in a grade of "zero" on the missed exam.

Students must write all exams to pass this course; skipping any exam will result in a final grade of "F."

All discussion in this class, whether in person or online, is to be expressed with courtesy and respect for your fellow students, the teaching assistants, and the instructor.

Students are expected to be fully engaged in class during lecture and tutorials. Multi-tasking during class is strongly discouraged, and the following activities are prohibited during lecture: talking, texting,

internet surfing, wearing of earbuds, and any other activities that will distract you or your fellow students. Students who engage in these activities will be asked to leave the lecture hall.

Students must receive passing grades on all assignments in order to pass this course.

*** Students may choose to count their lowest exam grade as 10% of the final grade. For example, if you do well on Exam 3, you may count that grade as 35% and count a lower grade from Exam 1 or Exam 2 as 10%.**
