Required Textbook:

Theodore M. Ludwig. *The Sacred Paths of the East.* 3rd ed., Prentice Hall, 2006. (Students will assume full responsibility if they choose to use the 2nd edition.)

Course Description:

This course will introduce Eastern religious traditions that have been and are practiced in Asia, focusing on India, Tibet, China, and Japan. We will explore Hinduism (India), Buddhism and its developments in India, Tibet, China, and Japan, Confucianism and Daoism (China) and Shintoism (Japan). By studying the historical developments of each tradition and its social, political, and cultural contexts, we will attempt to understand how philosophy and religious practices have shaped and affected human life. The textbook and lectures will be the main sources, but we will also make use of video and visual aids to explore the multiple dimensions of each tradition.

Core Competencies:

Students will learn about a variety of religious phenomena and concerns, such as philosophy, worldviews, morality, rituals, festivals. When studying Eastern religious traditions, for the sake of critical analysis, it is important at times to consciously suspend preconceived ideas derived from Western religious thought. One should try to avoid claims or views that are based on one's personal beliefs and avoid the application of these beliefs to the interpretation of the course material.

Format and Purpose of the Exam:

All exams consist of three sections: 1. fill-in-the-blanks, 2. short answers, and 3. a short essay. The exams are designed to test knowledge and information from the class materials including textbook, lectures, films and other visual aids (i.e. photos). As for the essay question, a comprehensive understanding of the subject as well as critical thinking will be evaluated.

General Comments

- 1. Exams must be written/submitted on the dates scheduled. No exceptions will be made, except for death, significant illness, or domestic affliction (supported by a valid, original note from a physician or counsellor). The instructor must be contacted within 24 hours of a missed exam or deadline either through e-mail, phone, or contacting the Department of Religious Studies (220-5886).
- 2. Students who are absent from class should make arrangements with a classmate for obtaining class notes or handouts. Handouts will only be made available in class. They will not be available through e-mail or other electronic means, and the instructor will not loan out lecture notes.
- 3. Recording of the lectures is not permitted, except by special permission.
- 4. In order to encourage and facilitate class discussion, students should study the relevant sections in the textbook prior to each class.
- 5. Students are encouraged to speak with the instructor during office hours if they have any questions. Phone conversations and e-mails are a less direct and effective means of communication.
