Course Description: Asian Religions is a general introduction to the academic study of Asian religious traditions. The course familiarizes students with the major religious and philosophical traditions of select geographical areas in South, Central, and East Asia. While refining the skills of empathetic description and non-evaluative comparison, the course also examines religion as an area of academic study, examining the function of religion in relation to human beliefs, social practices, and culture in general. A primary goal of the course is for all students to learn to define, accurately describe, and compare in a non-evaluative manner, various religious traditions within Asia so as to discover significant similarities and differences in various forms of human thought and behavior.

Course Organization and Requirements: The course is organized on a lecture/discussion basis following the topics and readings listed in the tentative schedule (attached). Students are expected to keep up with the reading schedule. Each student is required to write three exams and a short essay. The exams will be a combination of multiple choice, identification of terms and concepts, and short answer questions. For the terms students should consult the list of Key Terms at the end of every chapter in the required text. The essay will be a two-page descriptive and cross-cultural comparison assignment, the parameters of which will be distributed in class and posted on the course Blackboard website

Core Competencies: Students should take seriously the fact that this is an introductory course. The examination of the various traditions will therefore be in the nature of an overview rather than an in-depth analysis. And, for the most part, the course will be descriptive in nature, introducing students to the salient characteristics and terminology of major traditions that have their historical beginnings in India, China, and Japan. The readings, lectures and discussions will be directed to this descriptive task. The tests and written assignments however, are intended to encourage critical reflection on aspects of the religious traditions themselves.

Course Requirements and Weighting:

1. Regular preparation of reading assignments and lecture notes.
2. Examination #1, 20 points (20%) = Study of Religion, Hinduism **[Completed]**
3. Examination #2, 40 points (40%) = Hinduism, Jainism, and Early Buddhism
4. Writing Assignment, 30 points (30%) = instructions and guidelines explained in class and posted on the course website.
5. Examination #3, 10 points (10%) = Comprehensive exam with emphasis on Buddhist traditions.

Missed Exams: If you cannot write a test on the scheduled date due to a sudden illness or emergency, you must contact the instructor or the Department office as soon as possible. Transfer of weight from a missed test or unwritten essay to another course requirement will not be allowed in this course. Students must complete all course components to complete the course.

Course Requirements explained:

1. Examinations: All remaining examinations for this course are completed online. The examinations are NOT “open book”. Students are not permitted to consult any course materials while completing any of the examinations. Each examination will be available for a 14-hour period on the date assigned for the test. Examinations are timed, requiring students to complete the test within a specified time limit. It is important for students to take extra care to ensure that they have access to dependable power and internet service. Do not rely on your computer battery as your only power source when taking the exam. Plug in your computer power cord. “My battery died” will not be considered an

acceptable reason for failing to complete the test. For students who experience interruption to internet service while taking the exam, please contact the instructor as soon as internet service is restored. In the meantime, document your location, and the date and time of the interruption to internet service. If a student cannot complete an exam during the 14-hour period on the date assigned for the test due to interruption to internet service or computer malfunction, the student must notify the instructor of the interruption to internet service within 24 hours after the test period via email. Students that require a makeup test are required to arrange a time with the instructor.

IMPORTANT: Course content is **NOT** available on the day of an examination. Students need to ensure that they have completed preparation for the test before the day of the test.

Reviewing Tests:

The online tests for this course display the student's final score. Examinations answers are not displayed.

2. Examination #1 (20 points=20%) [Completed] and Examination #2 (40 points = 40%): These exams may consist of true/false, multiple choice, and short essay questions.

3. 'Key Term Re-description' Writing assignment (30 points= 30%) [Explained and Assigned]: This will consist of a two to three page descriptive and cross-cultural comparison assignment, the parameters of which will be distributed in class and posted on the course website. All writing assignments are **due by Thursday, April 9 at 4:00 p.m. via Dropbox on D2L**. Late papers will be **penalized 10% of the value of the assignment for each day the paper is late**. If you have any questions please contact me immediately.

4. Examination #3 (10 points = 10%): The format will be the same as for the midterm exams.
