Course description and outline:

In our increasingly multi-cultural and multi-religious society, a basic knowledge of various religious traditions is essential for anyone wishing to interact with their neighbours and society generally. This course provides an introduction to the study of religion by examining various religious traditions such as African, Buddhist, and Islamic, as well as the growth of rationalism and anti-religious movements.

This course requires approximately 3 hours reading each week. Some weeks the reading will take slightly more than 3 hours, in other weeks it will be slightly less.

Course competencies:

At the end of this course students ought to be able to:

- a) appreciate the field of religious studies and some associated disciplines;
- b) understand the meaning of some key terms in religious studies such as myth and religion;
- c) think critically about religious arguments;
- d) appreciate the importance of using correct academic methods intelligently;
- e) be able to make informed judgment about the reliability of specific books and texts.

First Assignment: Tweets and Blogs - worth 15% of the Final Grade

This is intended to engage you with a current issue related to the study of religion and enable you to see the significance the study of religion in today's world. For these assignments you must write a tweet and a mini blog.

For the first part of the assignment you must find a good news story about religion and write a Tweet about the story that can be read by following a URL that you provide in shortened form. Do not post the Tweet.

Then you must write, but not post, the text of a 250 word mini-blog that discusses the news story in terms of the issues studied in this course. Do not post the Mini-Blog.

Once these are both written in a Word document send them by email attachment to the email address: religion205@gmail.com

At the top of the assignment write your name and student number. Then give yourself a Web name that can be used when the Blog is posted to the Web. We suggest you use your first name, a nickname, or your initials so that you cannot be identified by other readers. In this way Professor Hexham and his TA will be able to identify your Blog after they post it.

After we receive the text of your Tweet and Mini-Blog they will be checked for problems and if approved posted to the Web. If they are not approved they will be returned to you for revision. The Tweet will be posted to Twitter using the hashtag: #worldrels. The mini-blog will be posted on the Web at: <http://uwreligions.wordpress.com/author/uwreligions/>

People whose surname begins with a letter from A-J must submit their Tweet and Mini-Blog by **Sunday 17 February** at the latest. Everyone else must submit it by **Sunday 31 March**.

Second Assignment: Comments – worth 15% of the Final Grade

Once the Tweets and Blogs are posted for the first group of students, with surnames A-J, then the remaining students, with surnames K-Z, must post three comments on different Mini-Blogs discussing what was said and relating it to what they have learnt in the course.

After the second set of Tweets and Blogs is posted by students with surnames K-Z, the remaining students with surnames A-J must write at least three comments on different Mini-Blogs. Thus every student writes a Tweet, a Mini-Blog, and three comments on blogs by other students.

In writing your Mini-Blogs and comments, be respectful and do not slander anyone. Remember these can be read by anyone with Internet access which is why they are anonymous except for the identifying name you give yourself.

First and Second Tests:

There will be two in-class multiple choice tests each worth 25% of the Final Grade.

The first test will be held in week 6, on Tuesday 12 February.

The second test will be held in week 12, on Tuesday 2 April.

The tests will be based on the readings and lectures.

Research assignment - worth 20% of the Final Grade

This is due in class on Tuesday 16 April.

- * Only hard copy papers will be accepted. Do not send them by email.
- * Late papers will lose 10 points per day.
- * Students must take the test on the assigned day or have a valid medical note.
- * Late exams and papers must have a valid medical note.
- * N.B. All written assignments will be graded with regard to both form and content.
