A word about textbooks

Traditionally professors have always used their own textbooks, for example, Ninian Smart wrote and used *The Religious Experience of Mankind* (1969) while Edward Conze did the same with *Buddhism: Its Essence and Development* (1961). So I am following in the tradition of my mentors which is what they encouraged me to do.

My books were published by Zondervan, the largest publisher of religious books in America. They are a subsidiary of Harper & Row and major textbook publisher. As such the books underwent both peer and editorial review before publication. Since then they have received excellent endorsements by leading scholars as well as equally good reviews. Two other things need to be noted. When *Understanding World Religions* (2011) was first published it was around half the price of equivalent textbooks issued by other publishers. Further, it was the only Religious Stud-

ies textbook to take African religions seriously thus ending the implicit racism of most other works in this field.

Course Description:

In our increasingly multi-cultural and multi-religious society a basic knowledge of various religious traditions is essential for anyone wishing to interact with their neighbours and society generally. This course provides an introduction to the study of religion by examining the ways we various religious traditions such as African; Buddhist; Islam; as well as the growth of rationalism and anti-religious movements are understood and studied.

This course requires approximately 3 hours reading each week. Some weeks the reading will take slightly more than 3 hours, on other weeks it will be slightly less.
