Continuation of Religious Studies 300.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An introduction to reading Biblical Hebrew. Emphasis will be on furthering students' competence in reading, grammar, writing, and vocabulary. Learning materials will include authentic Biblical texts, lexicons, Biblical commentaries, and practical exercises in reading, writing, and grammar. Student participation will be strongly encouraged as an essential component of practice.

*COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to read Biblical Hebrew texts and understand key components of their vocabulary and grammar. Students will become skilled users of Biblical Hebrew lexicons and will be able to explain and discuss sections of Biblical Hebrew texts with the support of commentaries and other resources.

There will not be a final exam for this course. Students will prepare a term project on linguistic and thematic elements of their selected Biblical passage(s). The oral presentation of the project will be inclass, followed by questions on both content and form. A guideline for the project will be posted on D2L and discussed in class. The two tests will be administered via D2L.
