Course Description:

A major form of religious expression consists of the various practices and rituals performed by individuals and the community

This course will survey a selection of representative rituals from eastern and western religious traditions, with special emphasis on life cycle (birth, marriage, death, etc.) commemorations and sacred time (liturgy, holidays). This portion of the material will be derived primarily from the Gwynne text.

In addition, you will be introduced to some of the theoretical and methodological components underlying academic “ritual studies” as presented by R. Grimes, illustrated principally through his ethnographic research into the annual Santa Fé *Fiesta*.

Online elements for this course:

The course will incorporate a set of on-line videos about the Santa Fé Fiesta produced by R. Grimes to accompany his book [<http://vimeo.com/album/1557600>].

Core Competencies:

Students will work on the following skills: critical appraisal of arguments and theories; practical application of theories and concepts presented in course readings and lectures; and clear expression of ideas.
