Course Description: This course is designed to present factual information and informed discussion on the subject of religions and their perspectives on environmental ethics and sacred space. Through a review of many leading eco-theologians and environmentalists who seek social and environmental justice, students will be introduced to a variety of global perspectives that address our conduct in and towards nature. What will become evident from this study is that spiritual sensitivity towards the environment has long been a self-evident reality encoded within the world's religions. In contrast to this relevant and enduring system of insight and values, our secular world's perspective has led to an unbalanced and sterile view of physical reality, habitat space, and significance of place, as expressed in and through the environment. Through the perspectives and interpretations of the various writers under review, this course will endeavour to present an alternative to "the death of birth" philosophy that pervades our cultures. Students will be presented with challenging, viable alternatives to this decimation based on knowledge, fact,

and insight into human nature and the problems we face as a species, living ethically in the environment which supports all life forms. Using the diversity and creativity of the perspectives presented, students will be introduced to the richness of ethical thought and depth of meaning that religions offer the enquiring mind.

Course presentation will consist of lectures, assigned readings, films, website information and class discussion.

Online elements for this course: D2L course notes, documentary links, Ted-Ed Talks.

Core Competencies: Students will develop a number of the skills identified in the University of Calgary statement of learning outcomes. These include: communication, thinking, ethical reasoning, computer literacy, information retrieval, and group effectiveness.

- The assigned readings, lecture material and methodology within the course should develop a student’s ability to think critically (i.e. judge, reflect, and analyze); web notes will further provide dissemination of information and enhance computer skills; preparation for examinations should foster the development of information retrieval and writing competency.
- It is important to remember that the attainment of any learning endeavour requires that students regularly attend lectures, read the required material, and complete all course work.
