COURSE OUTLINE – FALL 2016

Required Text

All readings will be posted on D2L or are available online through the University of Calgary's library.

Course Description

Please note that this course will run from September 6th to September 10th, 2016.

This course will run from 9:00 am to 5:00pm daily for 5 days. To be successfully in this course students should fully attend, participate and engage in the course throughout its duration. Students should prepare for the course by completing the pre-course readings (posted on D2L). Students should come to class each day with a small journal to write down responses to films shown in class. Note students are expected to hand in this journal on the last day of class.

Students should be aware of the following important regulations concerning Block Week courses: The last day to drop a Block Week course (without the course appearing on the student's transcript) is the end of the first day of lectures. The last day to withdraw from a Block Week course is the final day of lectures during the Block Week. Final grades for Block Week courses will not be required until the end of the term in which the course is offered.

This is a course designed to explore the manner in which religion manifests in many forms. Often religion transgresses normative boundaries into the realms of the technological, the strange, the paranormal, and the fantastical. We will ask questions like: “what does it mean to be human?” Both religion and science fiction can blur the lines between the mundane, the scientific, the paranormal, the supernatural, and the transcendent. The readings range from scholarly articles who study such phenomena to authors and believers who explore themes of transcendence. Through an analytical study of such experiences and stories we will aim to uncover some of the strange and uncanny ways of religion and science fiction.

Online Elements for this course:

Announcements, readings, and marks will be posted online on D2L. Students will hand in assignment on D2L’s “Dropbox” function.

Core Competencies

Students in this class will have the opportunity to reflect on issues in the study of religion and human nature. Students will be expected to develop skills in critical reading, thinking and peer discussions. Students will develop interpretive skills in their responses to films and other course material. They will also have the opportunity to enhance writing, research, and communication skills. This course will focus students’ analytic skills and help them to get to the core of an issue. Knowledge acquired in this course will help students reflect and converse more clearly and critically on the diverse nature of religion in society. **Please note: Due to the subject matter of the course some of the films are classified as Mature.**

Pre-reading Test

This test will be on the student’s pre-reading of course material. The test will be designed so that students will demonstrate a familiarity and comprehension of course readings.

Clip Test

The clip test will be in response to a portion of a particular film shown in class. Students will apply the knowledge and interpretative skills developed in class to a prompt.

Final Test

This test will take place on the final day of class and will ask students to answer a questions designed to assess student’s knowledge of material we have covered throughout the week.

*All tests will be graded on content and form.

Response Journal

Students will write a short response to each film shown in class. At the end of the last class students will hand in their journals for assessment.

Essay

The essay will be an opportunity for students to explore the course themes and material. There will be a question which students will be expected to respond to in an essay style format. Essays should be approximately 1500 words or 5 pages double-spaced (Times New Roman 12 point font). The specifics will be provided on D2L in advance and essays will be due shortly after class is complete. Students will submit their exams on D2L dropbox. Further details will be provided in class.

Grading

A numerical mark will be given for each course requirement. A letter grade will be assigned on the following number and letter grade scheme, standardized within the Department of Religious Studies:

N.B. All written assignments will be graded with regard to both form and content.

Students are expected to do the readings in advance. Students are expected to be prepared to fully participate in discussions on course material in a respectful manner. Students are expected to come to class with a journal that they will hand into the instructor on the last day of class. Also, students should familiarize themselves with the university's Academic Honesty policy. Please be courteous in email correspondence.
