There will also be a Coursepack of required readings available for purchase from the bookstore.

Students will also be asked to obtain certain classic essays for in-class discussion.–these may be made available for purchase, or be obtained through the Blackboard site for the course.

Course Description:

Hermeneutics is the classical term for interpretation theory. In this course we will first take an overview of the history of the application of this approach, examining traditional theories and evaluating their relevance for today. A further investigation will involve analyzing contemporary texts to learn the way such a method can still be applied, and how one can become aware of certain problematic techniques and strategies by employing what is called a “hermeneutics of suspicion.” The aim of the course is to provide students with a basic appreciation of the variety of ways that hermeneutics has always been implicated in acts of reading and interpretation. This, of course, has led to complex issues and disagreements as to its actual definition and use that remain extremely relevant for present day debates in philosophy and religion, e.g., especially those raised by postmodernism, postcolonialism, discourse theory, and intertextuality.

Online elements for this course:

Core Competencies

Students in this course will learn both the modern history of hermeneutics as well as practice the kinds of arguments employed in interpretation theory. As this is course in theory in the study of religion, students will gain an appreciation of the continuing discussions on the nature and role of context, subjectivity, and history in the understanding of religious texts as well as of

the wider context to which hermeneutic ideas have expanded in recent years. Students will sharpen their powers of textual analysis, improve their skills in verbal and written communication, as well as gain more insight through critical self-reflection of their own presuppositions.
