**COURSE NAME:** Advanced Topics in Christianity: Preachers, Theologians, and Musicians in

American Protestantism

CLASS DAYS & TIMES: This is an online course that will be delivered through the Desire2Learn (D2L) learning management system. Lectures will be delivered via Zoom sessions during scheduled class time 1:00-1:50 every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from January 11 to April 14. There will be no lectures the week of February 15-19 (Term Break) or on April 2 and 5 (Recognized Holidays).

**COURSE CALENDAR STATEMENT:** A seminar course examining topics, personalities and movements in Christianity from its origins to its modern and contemporary developments.

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** Protestantism is dominant in the religious landscape of the United States, a country with the largest Christian population in the world. Its leading figures in homiletics, music, and theology have inspired Christian thought in the United States and abroad. Their ability to act as representative voices in shaping Protestant piety and Civil

Religion is demonstrated throughout much of Protestantism's 400-year tenure in America. Their messages, delivered through sermons, songs, or lectures and writings, were persuasive in edification, worship, conversion, and education. Some figures gained celebrity status having served at the forefront of revivals, social movements, the missionary impulse, hermeneutics, and apologetics; preachers and musicians among the laity and theologians in academia.

This course will explore the lives and works of influential preachers, theologians, and musicians in the context of American Protestantism from the early-1600s to the present. Under the umbrella of religious studies, this course will investigate Christianity in general and Protestantism in particular engaging various disciplinary approaches including history, theology, missiology, cultural studies, musicology, homiletics, hermeneutics, and political studies.

Some course material will be synchronous, i.e. it will be offered at a specific time. Synchronous material will consist of lectures, seminars, and class presentations scheduled for Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 1:00-1:50. Some course material will be asynchronous, i.e. it will be not be scheduled at a specific time. Asynchronous material will include videos, documentaries, textbook readings, and various online resources. These materials and/or links will be made available through the course D2L website.

**COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:** Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- describe Protestant denominationalism in the context of the United States
- describe key movements in American Protestantism including fundamentalism, revivalism, evangelicalism and liberalism
- identify hermeneutical approaches to the Bible
- describe the influence of preachers, musicians, and theologians
- describe the role of homiletics, music, and hermeneutics in American Protestantism
- analyze and classify theological content in sermons, songs, and theological works
- prepare and present research related to an influential preacher, musician, or theologian in American Protestantism

**TESTS:** All tests for this course are completed online. Each test will be available for a 36-hour period (8:00 am until 8:00 pm the following day). Tests are timed, requiring students to complete the test within a specified time limit.

Tests are <u>not</u> "open book." Students are not permitted to consult any course materials while completing any of the module tests. The use of course materials during a test constitutes academic misconduct. Students must complete on-line tests individually. Collaboration with other students in taking tests is not permitted and constitutes academic misconduct.

**ADJUSTED FINAL GRADES:** The instructor will implement a standard measure of adjustment (.5%) for final grades. For example, a final grade of 64.5% (C) will be rounded up to 65% (C+). Please do not send email inquiries asking the instructor to increase or 'round up' your final grade. Only final grades are adjusted (individual tests are not rounded up).

**EXTRA ASSIGNMENTS:** There are <u>no</u> extra assignments for this course. Students will <u>not</u> be given an opportunity to submit extra work or retake tests to increase their grade.

**WEIGHTING OF ASSESSMENT:** The weighting for assessments is identified above. The weighting of assessments will <u>not</u> be changed to accommodate individual student requests.

**REVIEWING TESTS:** The online tests for this course display the student's final score. Individual test answers are <u>not</u> displayed. For students interested in seeing individual test answers, please make an appointment with the instructor at the end of the term after all tests are completed. At that time, you can review all your test answers via zoom.

MISSED OR LATE ASSIGNMENTS: If a student misses an assessment due to illness or an emergency, except in the case of extenuating circumstances, the student must report the absence to the instructor within 48 hours of the absence. If a makeup assessment is approved by the instructor, the student must take the initiative to arrange a time to complete the assessment within one week from the date of the missed assessment.

**EXPECTATIONS FOR WRITING:** All written assignments will be assessed at least partly on writing skills. Writing skills include not only surface correctness (grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, etc.) but also general clarity and organization. Sources used in research papers must be properly documented. If you need help with your writing, you may use the writing support services in the Learning Commons. **RESEARCH PAPER:** Students will select an influential preacher, musician, or theologian in American Protestantism and write a paper that provides biography, spiritual formation, analytical summary of influential works (sermons, hymns, hymnals, lectures, articles, books, etc.), reception and influence. Length: 2200-2500 words. Do not exceed 2500 words. Assignments that exceed 2500 words will be deducted 5% per 100 excess words. All research papers must include a word count. Students must submit their research paper in Dropbox between March 1 and April 15.

Note: If a student would like their research paper marked before their class presentation, the paper must be submitted to the instructor at least 10 days in advance of the student's panel presentation date, notifying the instructor of the early submission via email.

**SEMINAR:** Seminars are scheduled for February 1, February 12, March 5 and March 19. Each student will prepare a handout to share in leading one seminar. The handout must include a learning summary with glossary. Three students will share in leading the seminar, each student responsible for a 15-minute section of the 50-minute class.

**CLASS PRESENTATION:** Each student will present a 12-15 minute summary of their research paper followed by a 10-minute Q and A session. Students must submit a copy of their class presentation in Dropbox between March 1 and April 15.
