RELS 683.27: Hindu Myth and Ritual

Course Description:

This is a research-intensive course surveying secondary scholarship on the mythic literature of the Hindu *puranas* and the devotional practices and regional practices that have grown out of puranic literature.

Course Goals:

- To develop advanced research skills.
- To gain a mastery of seminal scholarship on the *puranas*, *mahatmyas*, and associated regional literatures.
- To develop and practice the writing skills necessary to create annotated bibliographies and reviews of scholarly literature.

Course Requirements:

1. *Participation:*

The student should plan on reading approximately one book per week. The books to be read each week will be selected in consultation with the instructor, and may come from the students' work on the annotated bibliography projects. The instructor and student will meet a minimum of once every other week to discuss the readings.

2. *Annotated Bibliographies:*

The student will conduct an exhaustive search for literature related to these topics utilizing library databases. Based on these searches and in consultation with the instructor, the student will create two annotated bibliographies of approximately 20-30 sources each. Deadlines will be determined in consultation with the student.

3. *Bibliographic Essay:*

The final paper for this course will be a 20-25 page bibliographic essay based on the annotated bibliographies the student has produced throughout the term. This essay should present the students' analysis and assessment of the state of scholarship in the field. Deadline will be determined in consultation with the student.

Grading:

1. Annotated Bibliographies: 40% (20% each)
2. Bibliographic Essay: 50%
3. Participation: 10%

A final letter grade will be assigned based on the following scale:
