Required Text(s):

Required readings will be assigned in class, to be consulted in the library or accessed online.

Please note that only print versions of the readings will be permitted in class, in accordance with the course electronics policy (see below).

Optional Text(s): Additional readings will be recommended in class. You are encouraged to read as much as possible!

Course Description: A seminar course exploring the nature and effects of conflict and communication within and between different religions, using as case studies 'pagan' (Greek and Roman non-Christian), Jewish, and Christian religions in the ancient Mediterranean (1st-5th centuries CE). Topics may include apologetics, persecution, appropriation, martyrdom, conversion, and proselytism.

Online elements for this course (if any): Some course resources will be posted on D2L. Please note that class notes/Powerpoint will not be posted on D2L. It is your responsibility to attend classes and make notes.

Core Competencies: This course involves detailed analysis and discussion of key primary sources and modern scholarship on ancient Mediterranean religions, focusing on the issues of conflict and communication. Students will strengthen their ability to read and interpret primary sources with due attention to genre, context, rhetorical strategies, and authorship. Students will enhance their skills of engaging critically and reflectively with academic writing, through close reading, in-class discussion, a book review, and presentations summarizing assigned readings. Students will develop their ability to present research orally in a clear, effective manner and to ask and answer questions about research in a seminar/conference setting. Students will enhance their capacity to devise and implement a long-term research project, and to argue effectively in written work, through a major research essay.

N.B. All written assignments will be graded with regard to both form and content.

Policy with regard to missed assignments/assessments: Written assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each day (not class) that the assignment is overdue. In-class presentations and seminar/conference participation must occur on the date scheduled. There are no remedial assessments in this course. Extensions/deferrals are not guaranteed; they may be granted only by prior arrangement with the instructor and only under exceptional circumstances, such as serious illness (you must provide a doctor's note or medical certificate) or death in the family. Head colds, needing more time to do the work, or having a rough week do not count!

Expectations for student conduct in this course: Students are expected to do the assigned readings before each class, and to come to class prepared to discuss what they have read. Active participation in-class activities and discussion, and in departmental seminars/conferences (including asking questions) is required. The assigned readings will provide a guide to the material, but students are expected to do additional reading to build their own independent knowledge of the subject, and to give evidence of this, especially in their research project assessments.
