MyEconLab is a complementary learning tool that allows the student to complete practice and assignment questions that correspond with each chapter of the book. The main benefit of MyEconLab is that the questions are "tailor made" for the course and that feedback is given after each question. Graded assignment questions will also be completed using MyEconLab. More information concerning student registration for will be provided in the first week of lectures.

Course Outline:

The primary purpose of this course is to introduce students to microeconomic theory and how it relates to the real world. The material includes an introductory approach to the concepts of consumption, production and the role of government in a mixed market economy. Emphases will be placed on important economic issues such as gains from trade, supply and demand, (and its role on price determination) price elasticity, consumer choice theory, production and costs, market structures and the existence of market failure. (And how to correct them) Current events dealing with the economy will be ongoing themes throughout the course.

Assignments:

- 1. In order to complete assignments in this course, you will be required to access MyEconLab. Log in information and the course key will be discussed during the first week of lectures.
- 2. Due dates for the graded assignments will be announced throughout the term. I will give at least one week's notice before the graded assignment is due.
- 3. Course material dealing with a particular assignment will typically be covered in class at least three days before the assignment is due; thus, assignments can be completed at any time up to and including the due date. Given these factors, only situations where someone can document illness or domestic affliction for an extended period (i.e., the entire 3 days prior to the due date) would possibly warrant shifting the assignment weight to the final exam. Furthermore, technical problems can be expected to occur with computer systems (and internet availability) so it may be a good idea to not wait until the last minute to submit your assignment. Technical problems will typically not justify shifting the assignment weight to the final exam.
- 4. Using MyEconLab, you will be given practice and graded problem sets. For the practice sets, you will obtain immediate feedback as to whether you have answered a question correctly. In many cases you will be provided with an explanation if you have not answered correctly. Your results in the practice problem sets are neither counted nor reported to the instructor. For the graded problem sets, you are allowed three attempts for each graded assignment. The highest mark_of your attempts will be counted towards your final assignment grade.
- 5. Emails regarding MyEconLab should be directed towards the providers of MyEconLab, (http://247pearsoned.custhelp.com) or to the teaching assistants (TAs), who will be assigned to this course.

Examinations:

- 1. Examinations will consist of multiple choice questions.
- 2. The midterm examination will be held during the lecture time. The exam must be completed during the specified time. Extra time will not be given for any reason.
- 3. The final examination will last for two hours and will be scheduled by the Registrar. **The exam** must be completed during the specified time. Extra time will not be given for any reason.
- 4. The use of a non-programmable calculator is permitted during the midterm test and the final examination. The use of graphing calculators, computers, cell phones, blackberry's, tablets and other electronic devices (unless approved by your instructor) is not permitted.

Assignments, tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis. The marks are then added using the weights indicated below and converted into letter grades. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will apply:

Notes:

- 1. Students should be aware that no "make-up" midterms will be given. Any student who finds it necessary to miss the midterm must notify the instructor in advance and produce a valid medical certificate (or other required documentation) in order to have the weighting adjusted. This adjustment will result in the final exam counting for 80% of the final grade and MyEconLab assignments counting for 20% of the final grade. Note that deferred final examinations may contain short/long answer questions. Also, deferred final examinations do not have to cover the same material or have the same format as the regular final examination.
- 2. Examinations will not be given prior to the scheduled date.
- 3. Students should be aware of the academic regulations outlined in The University of Calgary Calendar.
- 4. Students seeking reappraisal of a piece of graded term work should discuss their work with the instructor *within fifteen days* of work being returned to class. However, the earliest that grades will be discussed will be two days after the return of an assignment or examination.
- 5. Students will be responsible for all material listed on the course outline, regardless of whether or not the material has been covered in class, unless the instructor notifies the class that the material will not be covered.
- 6. Please note that the following types of emails will receive no response: emails not addressed to anyone in particular; emails where the recipient's name is not spelled correctly; anonymous emails; emails which do not specify the course and section in which you are registered; and, emails involving questions that are specifically addressed on the course outline.
