



Course Outline: The primary purpose of this course is to introduce the student to a more advanced level of microeconomic theory. This course analyses individual and group decision making such as consumer choice theory, demand theory, production theory, costs, business organization and decisions, distribution of income and competitive and non-competitive market structures. Current events dealing with microeconomic issues will be ongoing themes throughout the course.

Assignments:

1. Due dates for the three (3) graded assignments will be announced throughout the term. I usually hand out the assignment two weeks before the assignment is due. Group participation is encouraged but you must hand in your own work. (in your own hand writing)

Tutorials: *Students are required to attend one of the tutorial sessions each week. Each tutorial will be supervised by one of our graduate students and these tutorials will give you an opportunity to discuss course material and/or work through pre-assigned problem solving questions.*

Examinations:

1. Examinations will consist of multiple choice and problem solving questions.
2. The midterm examination will be held during the lecture time. **The exam must be completed during the specified time. Extra time will not be given for any reason.**
3. The final examination will last for two hours and will be scheduled by the Registrar. **The exam must be completed during the specified time. Extra time will not be given for any reason.**

4. The use of a non-programmable calculator is permitted during the midterm test and the final examination. **The use of graphing calculators, computers, cell phones, blackberry's and other electronic devices (unless approved by your instructor) is not permitted.**

Assignments, tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis. The marks are then added using the weights indicated above and converted into letter grades. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

Notes:

1. Students should be aware that no "make-up" midterms will be given. Any student who finds it necessary to miss a midterm exam must notify the instructor in advance (if possible) and produce a valid medical certificate (or other required documentation) in order to have the weighting adjusted. This adjustment will be redistributed to the final exam. Late assignments will be deducted 20% for each business day that the assignment is late.
2. Examinations will not be given prior to the scheduled date.
3. Students should be aware of the academic regulations outlined in The University of Calgary Calendar.
4. Students seeking reappraisal of a piece of graded term work should discuss their work with the instructor *within fifteen days* of work being returned to class. However, the earliest that grades will be discussed will be two days after the return of an assignment or examination.
5. Students will be responsible for all material listed on the course outline, regardless of whether or not the material has been covered in class, unless the instructor notifies the class that the material will not be covered.
6. Please note that the following types of emails will receive no response: emails not addressed to anyone in particular; emails where the recipient's name is not spelled correctly; anonymous emails; emails which do not specify the course and section in which you are registered; and, emails involving questions that are specifically addressed on the course outline.
7. I check my emails twice per day, once in the morning and once in the afternoon. (Excluding weekends) Since I teach hundreds of students, please send me an email only if it is absolutely necessary and/or in the case of an emergency.

8. It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations.
