Course Outline:

The main goal of this blended learning course is to provide proficiency in practical applications of economics using computers. Students will learn about the elementary and advanced features of spreadsheets using Excel. Examples will be drawn from Engineering Economics and Financial Economics.

The following topics (some additional ones may be added; some of these may be deleted) will be discussed in the course:

1. Introduction to Spreadsheets with Graphs and Charts

- 2. Basic Concepts of Financial Economics
 - Interest Rates
 - Mortgage Loans
 - Present Worth Analysis
- 3. Project Evaluation
 - Cash Flow Analysis
 - Sensitivity Analysis
- 4. Database Management Applications
 - Database Tools
 - Statistical Functions
 - Statistical Functions for Databases
 - Pivot Tables
- 5. Advanced Topics

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

The format of these exams will be discussed during the first week of classes. These exams will be open book and computer based.

Tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis, and then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

If, for some reason, the distribution of grades determined using the aforementioned conversion chart appears to be abnormal the instructor reserves the right to change the grade conversion chart if the instructor, *at the instructor's discretion*, feels it is necessary to more fairly represent student achievement.

A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a student to pass the course as a whole.

Calculators WILL NOT be allowed during the writing of tests or final examinations.

There will be a Registrar scheduled final examination. It will last for 2 hours; will be open book; will be computer based; and, will be held in a computer lab.

Tests and exams WILL NOT involve multiple choice questions.

Notes:

- Students seeking reappraisal of a piece of graded term work (assignments, midterm) should discuss their work with the Instructor *within one week* of the work being returned to the class. However, the earliest that grades will be discussed is two days after the return of a graded piece of work.
- Make-up midterm exams and deferred midterm exams will not be given. Deferred final
 examinations do not have to cover the same material or have the same format as the regular
 final examination.
- Students must pass the final examination in order to pass the course.
- It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations.
