Method 2? Assignment This course examines the nature, causes and consequences of international trade. (Some topics may be added or deleted depending on time constraints.)

- 1. Why Nations Trade: A Partial Equilibrium View ? Chapter 4
- 2. The Heckscher-Ohlin Model
- 3. Protectionism ? Chapters 6 and 7
- 4. Intraindustry Trade ? Chapters 3 and 9
- 5. International Factor Movements ? Chapters 10 and 15
- 6. Exchange Rates ? Chapters 12 and 13

A follow-up course, Economics 425 (International Trade II), provides students with a more detailed explanation of trade flows and goes on to consider issues such as: strategic trade policy in the presence of imperfect competition; trade, growth and technological change; trade-related aspects of intellectual property; and trade, trade policy and the environment. Normally, Economics 321, is a prerequisite for Economics 425 and Economics 357 (Intermediate Microeconomics II) is a co-requisite.

Whichever of these methods yields the higher grade will then be utilized.

Each student must work in a group, consisting of either 3 or 4 students, to complete the assignment. Only one assignment will be submitted by the scribe of each group. The assignment is due at the beginning of the lecture on the due date. Late assignments will not be accepted.

The midterm exam will be held in class on the date indicated. The time and location of the final exam, which will be two hours in length, will be scheduled by the Registrar?s Office. Exam questions will not consist of multiple choice questions. The use of a calculator during exams is not permitted.

The midterm exam, assignment, and the final exam are marked on a numerical basis. The grades are then added using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:
