### Course Description:

This course is the second in a pair of courses designed to acquaint students with microeconomic theory. Microeconomics is concerned with a systematic understanding of the choices of individuals, firms, and organizations. It seeks to address the social consequences of the behaviour of economic agents. This course will extend and build on the theory of the consumer, the theory of the firm, and the theory of perfect competition introduced in Economics 301. The theory of general competitive equilibrium will be studied intensively. Particular attention will be devoted to its efficiency and welfare properties. Thereafter, instances of market failure will be addressed: those covered will be imperfect competition, externalities, public goods, and informational asymmetries.

### Course Outcomes:

Students who successfully complete this course will further develop their mastery and understanding of the methodology of microeconomic theory by applying it to the following topics.

1. Extensions to Consumer Theory: Intertemporal Choice, Asset Markets, Uncertainty, Risky Assets, Insurance
2. Market Power: Monopoly, Price Discrimination
3. Imperfect Competition and Game Theory: Prisoner's Dilemma and Nash equilibrium; Cournot, Bertrand, and Collusion
4. General Equilibrium and the Fundamental Theorems of Welfare Economics: Exchange Economy; Production and General Equilibrium (2x2x2 and Robinson Crusoe)
5. Social Welfare and Economic Equity: Bergson Social Welfare Functions; Arrow's Impossibility Theorem
6. Market Failure I, Externalities: Tragedy of the Commons, Pigouvian Taxes and Subsidies, Property Rights, The Coase Theorem
7. Market Failure II, Public Goods: Optimality Condition; Private Financing and the Free Rider Problem
8. Market Failure III, Asymmetric Information: Adverse Selection, Moral Hazard, Principles and Agents
9. Public Choice: Government Failure
