I will provide detailed lecture notes. These notes are at least as important as the textbook.

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

There will be a midterm exam (worth 30%), a final exam (worth 30%), and approximately 10 in-class quizzes (worth 35%). In addition, 5% of the course mark will be based on participation. Students who are unable to write the midterm because of an illness, family emergency or religious observance will have the midterm weight shifted to the final examination. Documentation **MUST** be provided. The two lowest quiz marks will be ignored.

The midterm exam and the weekly quizzes are designed to reward **diligence**. In particular, most students who diligently prepare for the weekly quizzes will go into the final exam with a sound mark, somewhere in the B to A range.

The final exam is designed to reward **creative problem solving**. Students will find it significantly more difficult than the quizzes and midterm exam, and the average grade will be significantly lower (somewhere in the C range if past experience is any guide).

All work will be marked on a numerical basis, then aggregated, and converted to a letter grades. The following *grade conversion chart* is an approximate guide to letter grade equivalents.
