Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

There will be two tests, as well as a term paper project. There is no final examination.

Grading weights will be as follows.

Class Participation	20%
Test 1 (Tentative Date: February 12 th 2015)	25%
Test 2 (Tentative Date: March 31 st 2015)	25%
Term Project	30%

Grade for class participation is based on attendance, interactions/contributions in class discussions, and demonstrated familiarity with course readings. Details on term project requirements will be discussed in Day 1 of the class; detailed instructions will be posted on the D2L.

Exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis. The course grade is calculated using the weights indicated above, then converted to letter grades. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will apply:

There will not be makeup tests. Unless you have a documented health problems or family emergencies, if you fail to take a test, your score for the missed test will be zero. Grades of assignments handed in after class on the due dates will be reduced by 50%. If for a legitimate reason you do miss a test, the grade for the rest of the course will be given greater weight.

A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a student to pass the course as a whole.

Calculators are not needed or allowed during the writing of tests. Tests will not involve multiple choice questions.

Notes:

- Students seeking reappraisal of a piece of graded term work (term paper, essay, etc.) should discuss their work with the Instructor within *fifteen days* of the work being returned to the class.
- Make-up or deferred examinations will not be given. Students who are unable to write a midterm because of illness, family emergency or religious observance will have the midterm weight shifted to the final. Appropriate documentation is required in all cases.
