Course Description:

Essential mathematical background for studying Economics: economic models and equilibrium analysis, basic techniques of calculus including application in comparative statics, unconstrained and constrained optimization, and their applications to resource allocation problems.

Course Outcomes:

This course introduces students to the application of mathematical methods in economic theory. By the end of the course students are supposed to be able to

- 1. use and understand economics models;
- 2. to perform static equilibrium analysis in linear and nonlinear partial and general market equilibrium models;
- 3. to perform comparative statics analysis, and thus use concept of derivative, and rules of differentiation;
- 4. to perform comparative static analysis of general-function models;
- 5. to perform single-variable optimization, with extension in MacLauring and Taylor Series and *N*th derivative test for relative extremum;
- 6. to perform two-variable optimization and comparative statics of this type of goal equilibrium;
- 7. to perform constrained optimization using substitution and Lagrangian methods.

A passing grade on minimum of 50% of the course work is required for a student to pass the course as a whole.

If a student's letter grade on the final exam exceeds their midterm(s) letter grade, the weight of the midterm(s) may be transferred to the final exam at the discretion of the instructor. The student must have written the midterm(s) or provided supporting documentation for the absence(s) such as a medical note or statutory declaration.

Course material dealing with a particular assignment will typically be covered in class at least 5 days before the assignment is due; thus, assignments can be completed at any time up to and including the due date. Given these factors, only situations where someone can document illness or domestic affliction for an extended period (i.e., the entire 5 days prior to the due date) would possibly warrant shifting the assignment weight to the final exam. Furthermore, technical problems can be expected to occur with computer systems (and internet availability) so it may be a good idea to not wait until the last minute to submit your assignment.

The midterm exam(s) is take-home exam(s) designed and intended to be completed in 50 minutes. The exam(s) will be OPEN book. The exam(s) will be available on D2L. Student will download the exam from

D2L, complete the exam, scan it, and submit using Dropbox in D2L. Student will have 50% time extension to complete the exam, at a time of their choosing, within a 24-hour period determined by the instructor.

The final examination will be take-home, comprehensive, and scheduled by the Registrar. Students will download the exam from D2L, complete the exam, scan it, and submit using Dropbox in D2L. Student will have 50% more time to complete the exam, at a time of their choosing, within the 24-hour period that begins 24 hours before the end date of the Registrar's scheduled final exam for this course. The exam is designed and intended to be completed in two hours. The exam will be OPEN book.

All other course components will also be accessed, submitted, and returned through D2L.
