Course Description:

This course introduces students to the fundamentals of the literature on social and public choice. The social choice literature studies properties of voting rules, political competition, and social welfare functions. The public choice studies how interest groups, bureaucracy, the judiciary, and legislative and executive bodies of government interact and compete.
