**Course Outline:** This course follows from Economics 321, International Trade I. Economics 425 provides a more detailed explanation of trade flows, gains from trade and trade policy measures and considers such issues as: strategic trade policy in the presence of imperfect competition; trade, growth and technological change; trade-related aspects of intellectual property; and trade, trade policy and the environment.

### **Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:**

There will be 4 written assignments. Your assignment grade will be the average of three of the four assignment grades. Course material dealing with a particular assignment will typically be covered in class at least one lecture before the assignment is due and assignments can be done at any time prior to the due date. Only situations where someone can document illness or domestic affliction for an extended period (i.e. the entire 10 days prior to the assignment due date) would possibly warrant shifting the assignment weight to the final exam. Therefore, late assignments are not accepted and will be given a grade of zero.

**No deferred midterm will be given. In case of documented illness or family emergency, the extra weight will be shifted to the final examination. The Instructor should be notified in advance if a student will be unable to write a midterm. In any case, documentation must be provided as soon as possible (within a day or so of the missed midterm).**

All students must comply with the regulations published in the University Calendar concerning “Intellectual Honesty,” “Examinations,” etc. Students will normally be evaluated in accordance with the marking scheme given below:

Tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis, and then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

There will be a Registrar scheduled final examination, lasting 2 hours to be held in a classroom.
