Course Outcome: This course looks at project evaluation from both a private (financial) and economic (public) perspective. We investigate the welfare gains (or losses) when a public project is proposed. The students will obtain the necessary tools and knowledge to evaluate projects based on different perspectives.

Course Outline:

This course will focus on two aspects of cost benefit analysis. The first part of the course will look at the framework for constructing a financial cost benefit analysis. A review of basic finance and discounting will be examined. In particular, this part of the course focuses on how a firm selects a project based on mutually exclusive and independent alternatives. The second (and most comprehensive part of the course) examines the theoretical basis for economic (social) cost benefit analysis and the appropriate appraisal techniques. This part of the course examines the benefit/costs from a social welfare perspective and evaluates different proposals by using a social discount rate.

A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a student to pass the course as a whole.

(a) Assignments:

There will be two assignments, each of which is to be submitted at the beginning of class on the due date. In exceptional cases, they may be handed in before that date to the instructor personally. Answers to assignments will be discussed in class shortly after each assignment falls due. For this reason, late assignments will be given a score of zero, although you may still wish to have the work corrected and returned without a score being recorded. I will hand out the assignment approximately 7 to 10 days before the due date.

Students are encouraged to work on their assignments with other classmates. But each must write up his or her own answers in his/her own words. Copying or misrepresenting someone else's work as your own is a serious offence that will not be tolerated. Your attention is to be directed to the 'Statement of Intellectual Honesty' in the 2017-18 Calendar.

(b) Examinations:

1. Examinations will consist of problem solving questions. Tests and exams WILL NOT involve multiple choice questions.
2. The midterm examination will be held during the lecture time. **The exam must be completed during the specified time. Extra time will not be given for any reason.**
3. The final examination will last for two hours and will be scheduled by the Registrar. **The exam must be completed during the specified time. Extra time will not be given for any reason.**
4. The use of a non-programmable calculator is permitted during the midterm test and the final examination. **The use of tablets, computers, cell phones, blackberry's and other electronic devices (unless approved by your instructor) is not permitted.**

Tests, quizzes and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis. The marks are then added using the weights indicated above and converted into letter grades. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. The cut-off between letter grades will be at the midpoint between the numerical grades. Part marks of 0.5 or above will be rounded up; below 0.5 will be rounded down. For example, a grade of 79.5 will receive a B+ where a grade of 79.4 will receive a B.

Non-programmable calculators will be allowed during the writing of tests or final examinations.

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class; no reappraisal of term work is permitted after the 15 days. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.
