Course Description:

This is an intermediate course in environmental economics. The environment holds a unique role in the economy as both an input in production and a final consumption good in itself. Unlike other factors of production and/or goods and services there is no market for the environment. Hence, economic agents do not receive the usual price signals that guide the market to an efficient outcome; rather the market fails. The objective of the course is to use economic analysis to understand the reasons for market failure and evaluate government policy used to correct market failure.
