Course Description:

Students will apply econometrics methods to data to develop a solution to an economic resource allocation problem. Principles of project management and applications in economics data projects will be introduced. The completion of a group project, under the supervision of a faculty member, on an assigned economics data topic will be required. The project will normally involve data review, theoretical work, and econometric analysis. Submission and defense of progress reports and a final report are required.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes:

At the end of the course students will be able to:

- (1) Design and plan a project, and carry the project through to completion working in a team environment
- (2) Solve design problems in the project by synthesizing skills learned in a variety of courses taken during the course of the Economics degree program.
- (3) Communicate effectively within the team, with the advisor, and with the Course Coordinator.
- (4) Serve as a team leader and mentor other team members

Prerequisites/corequisites:

Econ 611 assumes familiarity with the material covered in Econ 615, including proficiency at mathematical statistics and calculus. Students should have proficiency with Python software – please use the recommended textbook by Tony Gaddis to improve your Python skills, if necessary.
