Course Description:

This is a joint Spring/Summer independent study course for MA students. The objective of this course is to provide you with an opportunity to conduct independent research. Specifically, during this part of your MA program, you will:

- 1. Find a topic of your interest and specify an appropriate research question,
- 2. Identify an appropriate research method to address your question,
- 3. Learn how to apply empirical and theoretical skills that you have acquired from core
- 1. curriculum courses to your specific question, and
- 4. Communicate with clarity the concepts, methods, and results of your research.

The instructor's role throughout this course is to support you in undertaking your research when you require assistance. The onus is on the student to act promptly and proactively in seeking assistance. The student assumes full responsibility for completing and presenting the research in accordance with the timetable provided below.
