Course Description:

This is the second part of the core PhD course in macroeconomics. The course is intended to introduce some selected macroeconomic issues, as well as to demonstrate how to use models and techniques to examine the issues. Both the issues and the models should be treated as important components of the course.

Course Outcomes:

The main purpose of this course is to prepare students to conduct research in macroeconomics.

Letter grades will be determined mainly based on students' academic performance (exam scores, assignment scores and term project scores). In general, students are expected to obtain an average of at least 60% for a B-. Students' efforts (such as attending lectures, finishing coursework on time, asking

questions) as well as students' progress (such as significant improvement of academic performance from the beginning of the term to the end of the term) will also be considered and might be used to adjust the letter grade (usually for one grade difference only, e.g. from B- to B). If the average academic performance of the class is significantly lower than expected, the class average will also be considered and might be used for adjusting the letter grade for the entire class.

A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a student to pass the course as a whole.

There will be a department scheduled final examination, held in a classroom, lasting 2 hours. Non-programmable calculators WILL be allowed during the writing of tests or final examinations.

Tests and exams WILL NOT involve multiple choice questions.

Absence from a Test/Exam

THERE WILL BE NO MAKEUP OR DEFERRED QUIZZES under any circumstances, nor may the quizzes be written early. Students unable to write the quizzes because of documented illness, family emergency, religious observance, or university-sanctioned event will have the weight shifted to the final examination; otherwise a grade of zero will be assigned. If a student cannot write their final exam on the date assigned by the Department, they need to arrange for a deferred exam with the department.
