**COURSE TITLE: Approaches to Literature: High/Low Culture**

**Course description:**

Cultural critic Ien Ang writes that recent scholarly interest in so-called “low” or “popular” culture has made “high culture”—the traditional subject matter of study—the newly “ostracized category.” Her comments suggest that, while the divide between “high” and “low” cultures still exists, “low” culture is more available, more discussed, and more valued than ever before. By pairing texts that connote differently with respect to “high” or “low” literary culture, this course encourages students to explore the meanings and functions of literature with respect to their own reading practices. Students are invited to ask which texts are suitable literary objects of study and why. What happens when “high” and “low” texts treat the same subjects or themes? How might literary works of “high” and “low” culture inform each other? By considering questions like these students will learn to critically analyze course texts and to construct clear and logical written responses.

JRR Martin *Game of Thrones*

Horace Walpole *Castle of Otranto*

Stephen King *The Shining*

**Assignments and Evaluation:**

All assignments must be typed and double spaced, employing a legible font and 1” margins. Do not provide a title page but on the first page include the following information: your name, the instructor’s name, the course number, the date, and a brief, descriptive title. Please include your last name and page number on all subsequent pages. You **MUST** staple your assignment. No binders, folders, or other containers, please.

Electronic submissions will **NOT** be accepted except by prior arrangement with the instructor.

### In-Class Writing Skills Exercises (4 x 5% = 20%)

Students will complete four (4) Writing Skills Exercises in class. Each exercise will ask the student to apply specific writing skills discussed in lectures (e.g. paragraphing, outlining, thesis development, etc.) to selections from the texts. Each Writing Skills Exercise is worth 5% for a total of 20%. When grading, the instructor will consider the student's degree of mastery of the writing skills in question AND the student's understanding of the assigned text.

### First Outline and Essay (20%)

This assignment will comprise an outline and a five-page essay (1500 words) on a topic that the instructor will provide. When grading, the instructor will consider the student's ability to construct a coherent and fluently expressed argument about course texts, with supporting evidence drawn from those texts.

### Second Outline and Essay (30%)

This assignment will comprise an outline and a five-page essay (1500 words) on a different topic that the instructor will provide. When grading, the instructor will consider whether or not the student demonstrates increasing mastery of all aspects of persuasive writing.

### Final Exam (30%)

This is a Registrar's Scheduled Final Exam. The exam will consist of short answer and/or essay questions and will cover ALL course materials. Course texts ONLY will be allowed in the examination.

The dates for Winter 2014 exams are April 17; April 19-29. Students must be available for examinations up to the last day of the examination period.

Students must complete all assignments in order to receive a passing grade on the course.

Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each business day [not class] that the assignment is overdue.

Please make every effort to take assignments directly to the instructor. If it is not possible to do so, take your assignment to SS 1152 and put it in the dropbox. Your assignment will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox. It is your responsibility to keep a copy of all assignments in case of loss by any cause. Assignments cannot be returned by staff in the Department office.

## **PLAGIARISM**

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
