Course description:

The seven deadly sins invite and repel us in equal measure. A little is fun, but a lot spells trouble—that's what makes them deadly. Taking the seven deadly sins as its theme, this course asks how does literature define envy, greed, lust, pride, gluttony, sloth, and wrath. What do prints, films, and books have to tell us about our relationship with these alluring, alarming vices? Through individual close reading and group discussion of course texts, students will learn to construct thoughtful interpretations of works of literature and express their understanding as clearly written arguments.

Assignments and Evaluation:

All assignments must be typed and double-spaced, employing a legible font (e.g. Times New Roman) and 1" margins. Do not provide a title page, but on the first page include the following information: your name, the instructor's name, the course number and section, the date, and brief, descriptive title. Please include your last name and page numbers on all subsequent pages. You MUST staple your assignment. No binders, folders or other containers, please.

Electronic submissions will NOT be accepted except by prior arrangement with the instructor.

Three Reading/Writing Quizzes (3 x 5% = 15%)

Students will write three in-class Reading/Writing Quizzes. Each quiz will ask the student to apply specific writing skills discussed in lectures (e.g. paragraphing, outlining, thesis development, etc.) in order to answer questions on the assigned texts. Each quiz *will* ask students to construct part of an essay-style answer (like those on the Final Exam). In addition, each quiz *may* include short-answer or multiple-choice questions. When grading, the instructor will consider the student's success in constructing a clearly written answer AND the student's understanding of the assigned texts. Students who miss a quiz can write a make-up quiz on a mutually agreed-upon date at the end of term. Students who miss a quiz must contact the instructor as soon as possible.

First Outline and Essay (25%)

Students will write an outline according to the model discussed in lectures AND an essay of 1200 words. The instructor will provide a choice of questions. Students will choose one and respond in the form of an essay with a persuasive argument. When grading, the instructor will consider the student's ability to answer the question with a logically coherent and fluently expressed argument, fully supported by evidence drawn from the appropriate course texts.

Second Outline and Essay (30%)

Students will write an outline according to the model discussed in lectures AND an essay of 1200 words. The instructor will provide a new choice of questions. Students will choose one and respond in the form of an essay with a persuasive argument. When grading, the instructor will consider whether or not the student demonstrates increasing mastery of all aspects of persuasive writing.

Final Exam (30%)

This is a Registrar's Scheduled Final Exam. The exam will consist of a choice of essay-style questions and will require students to employ strategies discussed in lectures and practiced in essays and quizzes. ALL course material will be covered in the examination.

Students must be available for examinations up to the last day of the examination period (April 18-29).

Please note the following:

- Students must complete all assignments in order to receive a passing grade on the course.
- Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each business day [not class] that the assignment is overdue.
- Please make every effort to take assignments directly to the instructor. If it is not possible to do so, take your assignment to SS 1152 and put it in the dropbox. Your assignment will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox. It is your responsibility to keep a copy of all assignments in case of loss by any cause. Assignments cannot be returned by staff in the Department office.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
