COURSE TITLE: Approaches to Literature: "Fighting Words: Canadian First World War Literature"

Course description: This course examines how Canadian women and men writers have depicted the nation's contribution to and participation in the First World War. It includes novels written during or shortly after the war, as well as novels and plays by contemporary writers re-visioning that wartime period. As the course calendar suggests, the course will "emphasize fundamental skills" such as "how to write logically, clearly, and persuasively."

Assignments and Evaluation:

Submission of TWO mini-essays (300-500 words) on two novels of the students' choice. 20% x 2=40%

Submission of ONE mini-essay to be written in class (500-750 words). For this assignment, the instructor will choose which novel the students will write on. 20%

Detailed requirements for these submissions, as well as the specific due dates, will be made available during the first week of class.

Students have TWO choices for 10% of their grade. They may choose to be part of a group presenting background information on relevant battles, military leaders, events, or issues raised within the texts (20 minutes' duration). For this assignment, students will submit a summary of their written presentation (which may be supplemented with audio/visual materials) prior to their talk (300-500 words). Alternatively, students may choose to work in groups and submit a number of questions to inspire class discussion (20 minutes' duration). For this assignment, students must also conduct research on the texts they have chosen to generate discussion on. They must submit their questions to the instructor prior to the discussion (300-500 words). The size of groups for these assignments and the number of questions depends upon

enrollment. I will provide specific details about these assignments, as well as due dates, during the first week of class.

- Students must be available for examinations up to the last day of the examination period (April 16-27).
- Students MUST complete all assignments in order to receive a passing grade in the course.
- Electronic submission of assignments is NOT permitted. Students will hand in written assignments (including information on group presentations and discussion questions) at the beginning of class. Failure to hand in any of these assignments at the beginning of class will incur late penalties of one letter grade per business day.
- Please note that you may ONLY use laptop computers in class ONLY to take notes or for class presentations.
- I will endeavor to respond to email inquiries in a timely fashion, but I will not go over information missed in class, nor will I discuss graded material over email. Please make an appointment to see me if you wish to discuss your group assignments, as well. Please also exchange contact information with a student in class early in the semester so that the student can take notes for you and pick up handouts or other relevant materials.

Please note that no assignments will be accepted one week past the assignment deadline without the prior consent of the instructor.

Please make every effort to take assignments directly to the instructor. If it is not possible to do so, take your assignment to SS 1152 and put it in the dropbox. Your assignment will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox. It is your responsibility to keep a copy of all assignments in case of loss by any cause. Assignments cannot be returned by staff in the Department office.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
