Course description: A seminar emphasizing critical reading and writing. The course prepares students for advanced undergraduate studies in English. Anti-requisite: English 201. Note: Compulsory for, and limited to, English Majors and Minors.

This course closely studies individual short stories and poems for specific techniques that the author employs to create meaning and pleasure. The course thus aims to understand the impact of a text on an unsuspecting 'lay' reader and focuses on the responsibility of a student of English literature to comprehend, analyze, and critique that impact.

Essay 1: 1000 words (20%)

Mid-Term Exam (Closed Book) (25%)

Group Presentation (15%)

- There will be no formal written component; however, students are encouraged to submit evidence of work leading up to the presentation.

Essay 2: 1000 words (20%)

Class Participation (10%)

In-Class Exam (Closed Book) (10%)

Class Participation 10% -- Marks will be awarded for the following:

1. Regular and quality submission of in-class assignments.
2. Active participation in discussions and group activities.
3. Successful participation in random quizzes and debates based on lecture material and the readings.
4. Initiative in bringing to the attention of the class relevant popular and academic information.
5. Ability to interact with the class in a professional and enthusiastic manner.

There will NOT be a Registrar Scheduled Final Exam in this course.

All assignments must be completed in order to receive a passing grade on the course.

Late assignment policy: Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each day [not class] that the assignment is overdue.

Assignments must be emailed as a Word document to the instructor at cjoseph@ucalgary.ca before midnight of the due date. The file name must be according to the following format: for example, LastnameFirstname_ENGL203Essay1_Oct6-2019. Students must always copy themselves on any assignment emailed to the instructor, and save the item until final results are received from the registrar's office. If in doubt of the procedure, it is the responsibility of the student to check with the instructor well in advance.

Grading system:

Actual numerical grades obtained, not their letter grade or percentage equivalent, will be used in calculating the final grade. Letter grades for assignments will be converted into numerical values using the scale below (at the instructor's discretion) in order to calculate the final course grade.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:

Students who are absent from class assessments (tests, participation activities, or other assignments) should inform their instructors as soon as possible. Instructors may request that evidence in the form of documentation be provided. If the reason provided for the absence is acceptable, instructors may decide that any arrangements made can take forms other than make-up tests or assignments. DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH STATEMENT ON PRINCIPLES OF CONDUCT
