Course Objectives:

This course focuses on a selection of postcolonial novels, situating their discussion in the historical moment when decolonizing the mind and reading or writing back to the centre are becoming part of the English literature scholar's ethical and political responsibility. The course will organize close readings and seminar discussions along the following line of questions: How does the postcolonial novel challenge and question Eurocentric representations of the cultural or racial Other? In what ways does it decenter, revise, and enrich the canon of English literature established in the imperial center? How does it change our received ideas of culture, society, tradition, and modernity? Emphasizing critical reading and writing, the course offers students the opportunity to develop their ability to think rigorously and provocatively. It begins by introducing students to critical and conceptual tools necessary for productive reading.

Students must be available for examinations up to the last day of the examination period (April 18-29).

For take-home essays, please submit a thesis statement two weeks before the due date. Both hard copy and electronic version are acceptable though the latter is preferred.

The group work grade is designed to encourage students to take group work seriously. All members of a group will receive the same grade, except for those absent when the group work assignment is prepared or presented, who will receive an F.

Students must submit all assignments to qualify for a passing grade. All take-home written assignments must be typewritten and double-spaced. You should use a 12 point type-size and a readable font. Take-home essays must adhere to the format and documentation outlined in the MLA Handbook (6th or 7th Edition). To avoid plagiarism, please read the attached statement on plagiarism.

Please keep a copy of everything you submit. Except in cases of illness or crisis, late papers will be penalized a fraction of a grade per day (i.e., a B paper handed in a day late will receive a B-; a B paper handed in two days late will receive a C+).

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
