Course description:

An examination of the relationship of literature to the world around us, with instruction in close reading and critical writing. Considers how literature as a cultural practice responds to and reflects its social context.

Course learning outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Close read a variety of literature including short stories, poetry, and the novel.
- 2. Demonstrate analytical skills through challenging discussions and writing activities.
- 3. Apply literary terminology, including close reading terms, to works of literature in discussion and writing.
- 4. Identify scholarly articles and books in a research essay on literature, using standard MLA documentation style.
- 5. Write a research essay of literary analysis using a process of drafting and revising.

Academic Integrity Assignment	Grade 10%	Complete the academic integrity assignment including a brief modified annotated bibliography. Instructions will be distributed	
Close Reading Essay	20%	during class. Due via D2L in .docx format. Write a 1000-word essay using the Parker text and the Grudova text. Instructions will be distributed during class. Due via D2L in .docx format.	
Midterm Exam	20%	Complete an in class closed book midterm exam using short answers and multiple choice. The exam covers material from the start of the course up until the date of the midterm.	
Final Research Essay	30%	Write a 1200-1500 word essay using the Parker text, the Johns text, and scholarly articles. Instructions will be distributed during class. Due via D2L in .docx format.	
Final Exam	20%	Complete a Registrar scheduled final exam. The exam is closed book. The exam is scheduled by the Registrar. The exam will be short answer, multiple choice, and short essay. The exam will be cumulative (cover all material from the beginning of the semester).	

 Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (e.g., an A- to B+) for each calendar day (not class meeting) that the assignment is overdue. No assignments will be accepted one week past the assignment deadline without the prior consent of the instructor.

Additional Regulations:

- The course has a Registrar scheduled final exam. The exam is closed book and written in person.
- Students must be available up to the last day of the examination period from Monday June 19-Wednesday June 21, 2023.
- There are no extra-credit assignments for this course.
- Unless otherwise specified in assignment instructions, all assignments must be submitted to the D2L Dropbox for the course. All assignments are due by 11:59 PM (or midnight) of the due date. Assignments submitted late will be subject to a third of a grade deduction for each calendar day that the assignment is overdue.

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- Although the A+ is solely an honorific that entails no additional points in the four-point system, the course instructor will employ this mark to distinguish superlative work that far exceeds expectations in style, correctness, intellectual depth and breadth, sophistication, and originality.
- Students must reach the minimum percentage threshold for the grade range to receive that letter grade. For example, to receive an A- a student must have surpassed the minimum threshold of 80.00% in the course.
